## Pastor's Page for February 2017

## Dear Saints,

At our Annual Council Retreat last month in January, we prayed for discernment in evaluating leadership needs in our ministry context. We are grateful for many strengths of the All Saints congregation in the witness of our members, and acknowledge the areas of growth needed to build up the Body of Christ both within and beyond our community of faith. We ask your recommitment to actively participate in fulfilling our shared ministry calling to: "Go, make disciples, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. Surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age." (Matthew 28:19-20)

The theme chosen for the 2017 emphasis theme of ministry is *The "BE"* Attitudes: Belonging, Believing, Becoming. When we demonstrate a Christ-like presence in our witness, people will experience blessings (another B word) through the ways we behave (and another B word). Like any social gathering and family function, I to put the reminder out there: Everybody welcome ... and everybody behave. To me, this is healthy hospitality and demonstrates mutual respect. When we fail to behave in such a manner, it is high time for an attitude-check. What are the right attitudes for our witness and relationships? I submit Matthew chapter 5 as your Beatitudes guide ... the right attitudes to be at ... always.

Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven.

Blessed are they who mourn, for they shall be comforted.

Blessed are the meek, for they shall inherit the earth.

Blessed are they who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they shall be satisfied.

Blessed are the merciful, for they shall obtain mercy.

Blessed are the pure of heart, for they shall see God.

Blessed are the peacemakers, for they shall be called children of God.

Blessed are they who are persecuted for the sake of righteousness, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven.''

Most people seek a church essentially to belong, to believe, and to become. For Lutherans, *Belonging* often comes first; infant baptism is belonging before believing. We belong to a community of faith, a body of believers, to a family in Christ. Visitors should find friendship, support, and hospitality.

*Believing* is central to our life together, seeking to reveal God's presence as Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. We believe the Bible is God's Word to us and how it continues to open doors for ministry. *Becoming* is what it means to be created human, growing in mind, body and spirit through the changing seasons of life and faith. We strive to grow into the image God intended for each us, united in Christ to what we've been given, taking form in ministry, service, giving, hospitality and love. Those who suffer despair and disability should experience Christ's healing presence and forgiveness. While you and I cannot always be timely conduits for God's grace, we certainly don't want to cause spiritual disconnects. The Beatitudes plants seeds of faith until God brings new fruit.

In order for *The "BE" Attitudes: Belonging, Believing, Becoming* to be revealed, each member of All Saints needs to consider four basics of Christian Life:

- Regular Worship Our life-giving roots in Scripture-based Services is praise, thanksgiving, growth, Sacraments, community, inspiration and spiritual motivation.
- Spiritual Growth Every one of us, oldest to the youngest, should be invested in Christian Education on some level.
- Personal Ministry St. Paul declares we are the priesthood of all believers. Let us mutually strive to help people discover their passion, their interests and gifts: teaching, singing, cooking and feeding, healthcare, visitation, prayer chains, organizational leadership, decorating, finance, construction.
- Stewardship God calls each of us to be stewards ... of the earth, our bodies, our relationships, our time

and money. We are to take care of what we have been given, invest it wisely, remembering who is the owner. I keep reminding people: Remember who you are and whose you are!

I hope you can help us flesh out the ministries of All Saints in this coming year, which affirm your own spiritual calling and presence in the congregation. If you and I can strive to be the kind of people we hope to find in any Christian community, this year's ministry theme shall indeed come to life. Imperfect people are able to convey how we are all still perfectly loved ... in the name of the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.
